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# A NOTE FROM OUR ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Welcome to STEW -

We are producing Stew at a moment when this country continues to repeat the same cycles and then refuses to take responsibility for them. Violence, particularly against Black communities and Black women, is treated as inevitable. Grief is rushed. Accountability is delayed or avoided. Families are left to carry the consequences while systems remain unchanged.

This play does not allow that avoidance.

It is also important to say this plainly: this production did not come together without challenges. As the Artistic Director of this company, I take responsibility for the shortcomings that occurred in leadership along the way. Building something new, especially something committed to hard, necessary work, means learning in real time. Mistakes were made. Adjustments were required. Growth is not theoretical—it happens under pressure. What matters is how you respond.

Rebel Phoenix Theatre Collective was founded on the belief that theatre should not be neutral. Neutrality protects systems that harm people and allows cycles to continue unchallenged. Producing Stew is a deliberate choice to confront those cycles, not only onstage, but within our own practices as a company.

This work asks us to look honestly at generational harm, at responsibility, and at what it takes to break a pattern instead of inheriting it. That demand applies to artists, leaders, institutions, and audiences alike.

Thank you for being here, for engaging with this story, and for holding space for work that does not pretend growth is easy or clean. Accountability is part of the process. So is learning. So is doing better.

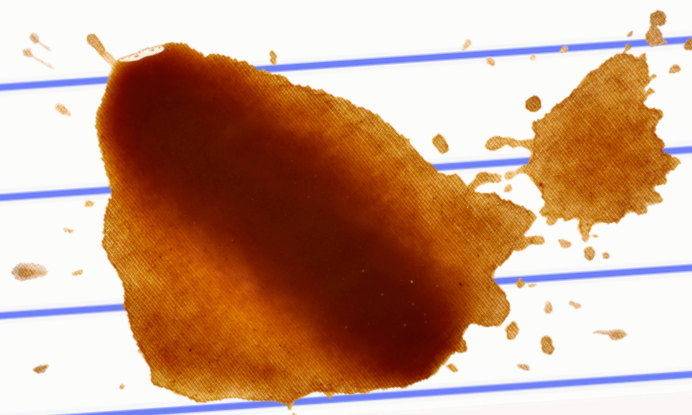

Zora Howard is a Harlem-bred writer and performer. Plays include **STEW** (2021 Pulitzer Prize Finalist; Page 73 Productions); **THE MASTER'S TOOLS** (Williamstown Theatre Festival); **BUST** (2022 Susan Smith Blackburn Prize Finalist; 2022 L. Arnold Weissberger New Play Award Finalist); **HANG TIME** (2022 Creative Capital Award Finalist); and **GOOD FAITH**. Her work has been developed at Ojai Playwrights Conference, **SPACE** at Ryder Farm, The Lark, Primary Stages, and Cape Cod Theatre Project, among others. In 2020, her film **Premature** (2020 Film Independent John Cassavetes Award nominee), which she co-wrote with director Rashaad Ernesto Green, opened in theaters following its world premiere at the 2019 Sundance Film Festival. Zora is the inaugural Judith Champion Fellow at MTC, a 2022 Lilly Award and Helen Merrill Award recipient and is currently under commission from Seattle Rep, MTC, and Wessex Grove.

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## **Felicia Penza ~ Director**

Felicia Penza is a multidisciplinary artist, vocalist, writer, and graphic designer based in Phoenix, Arizona. Her work spans the intersections of storytelling, music, and visual design, with recent credits including directing and performing in a range of community and professional productions across the Valley. She recently co-directed *Topdog/Underdog* with 5th Wall Playhouse, 2025, and brings over a decade of experience as a performer and creative collaborator in theatre and live arts.

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There is a particular weight that Black women carry. It is ancient, inherited, and learned early. And yet, alongside that weight lives something just as powerful: joy. Laughter. Brilliance. Black Girl Magic is not a slogan. It is survival. It is alchemy.

While I have performed on stages for years, *Stew* marks my first solo effort in the director's chair. I am a deeply collaborative creative, and this process has been rooted in trust. These women have sat with me, cried with me, laughed with me (LOTS of laughter) and held space with me. Together, we have supported one another as we prepared a dish seasoned with truth, humor, secrets, faith, and family.

Nina Simone's *Four Women* has lived with me since the moment I first read the script last year. These four Black women each carry their own story. Some are familiar. Some are passed down through generations. Some are things we have never witnessed out loud before. And some are the pains and heartaches we survive by pushing down, simply because there is still more work to do and too many people depending on us. It is a badge of honor and pride to be a Black woman. But navigating the world while setting aside our own grief so we can keep going? That chapter is one I know well.

I think often of my grandmother, Lula Mae Hampton, whose kitchen had yellow walls with green accents, much like the one you see onstage tonight. She leaned fiercely into her faith, trusting God to always right the ship, even as she quietly worried about everyone and everything. In moments of chaos, she was our anchor, our true north, guiding the family back on course. That resilience was passed to her daughter, my formidable mother, Annette Penza. I carry those inherited traits, both the strength and the weight, and they have shaped who I am and how I have guided these extraordinary actors.

Thank you to Rebel Phoenix Theatre Collective for trusting me with this vision. And thank you for taking a seat at the table tonight. It is my hope that you leave nourished.

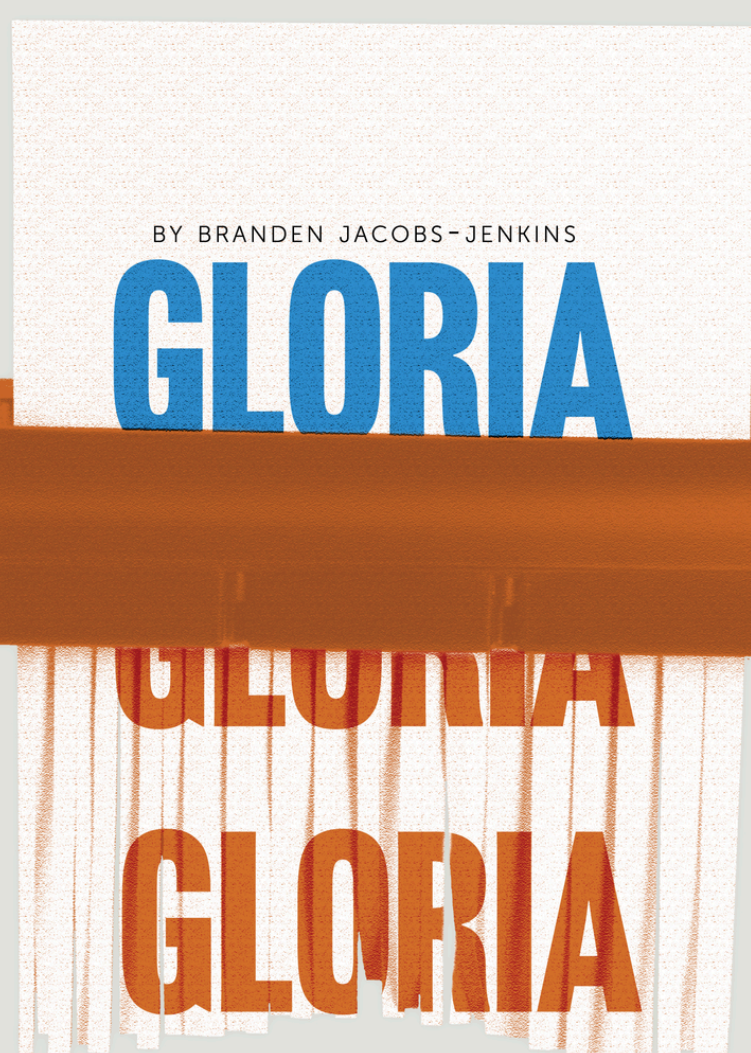
